




THE OSM AND THE GUILDE DES MUSICIENS ET MUSICIENNES DU QUÉBEC HAVE ANNOUNCED THE SIGNING OF A COLLECTIVE AGREEMENT

Montreal, October 29, 2023 – The Orchestre symphonique de Montréal (OSM) and the Guilde des musiciens et musiciennes du Québec (GMMQ) have announced their signing of a collective agreement binding the Orchestra and its musicians for five years since October 27, 2023.

The OSM and a General Assembly of musicians adopted by 93% approval the agreement reached between negotiation committees on behalf of its employers and unions. The agreement was also unanimously approved regarding its parameters by the OSM Board of Directors.

"This successful outcome of our collective negotiations assures a stability reflecting harmonious relations within the Orchestra and will preserve an environment conducive to the artistic excellence that has characterized the OSM since the beginning. It is very good news for audiences, patrons, sponsors, and other partners of the Orchestra's extensive community," stated the **OSM Chairman of the Board Lucien Bouchard**, adding, "Such solid foundations are what will ensure the OSM's development and further its national and international profiles."

"We are pleased that a satisfactory agreement with the OSM's administration has been reached. We remain confident that we can work together in the future, through these difficult times, so that the OSM can continue

to maintain its vital presence within the artistic community, both in Quebec and on the international stage," stated **Edouard Wingell**, **bassist and President of the musicians' negotiation committee**.

The two committees have entered a five-year agreement on non-monetary clauses and have settled for the next two years on a salary schedule. The financial parameters of this agreement provide, among other things, for annual increases totalling 4.1% in contractual fees and an improvement of seniority bonuses, which have been increased for the period from 2023 to 2028. Moreover, virtually all non-monetary clauses at issue were negotiated and mutually agreed upon based on the two committees' respective interests. The most significant changes involve auditions and access to tenure, work and services scheduling, tours, sick leave, and pension plans.

Exchanges between the parties proceeded in a climate of remarkable openness and dialogue, facilitating agreement on mutually satisfactory solutions to the issues raised from both sides. The **OSM** and the **GMMQ** wish to acknowledge the input of the two negotiation committees' members. On behalf of **OSM** musicians: Edouard Wingell, Scott Feltham, Austin Howle, Sylvain Murray, and Denys Derome, assisted by Bernard LeBlanc, Director of Symphonic Services with the Canadian Federation of Musicians (**CFM**), representing the **GMMQ**. On behalf of **OSM** management: Michel Hamelin, Marianne Perron, Sophie Brunette, Ines Lenzi, Jean Gaudreault, Françoise Henri, Sébastien Almon, and Bruno Valet.
